AVOIDING BURNOUT - "THE ANTIDOTE"

- "Divide them into 1/3's"
- 1/3 Get in trouble & learn their lesson the 1st time.
- 1/3 Going to prison no matter what you do.
- 1/3 In the middle, straddling the fence & aren't sure which way they will go.
- "Be professional and provide quality services to all but focus on the 1/3 that are in the middle. These are the one's that you have the best chance of helping."

WHAT IS THE PURPOSE OF JUVENILE COURT SYSTEM?

Section 51.01 – Purpose & Interpretation

- Provide protection of the public and public safety
- 2. To act in the best interest of the child "Remove the taint of criminality."

*1995 The word "punishment" was added (Gov. G.W. Bush)..."To promote the concept of punishment for criminal acts."

DELINQUENT OFFENSE & BEHAVIORAL CHANGES

1980's – Runaway, truancy, school behavior problems, theft, shoplifting, simple assault, occasional marijuana use.

Present 2024:

- Felony offenses
- Gangs
- Aggressive/assaultive behaviors
- Firearms/weapons use
- Mental health issues & frequent prescription of psychotropic medication
- Substance use (marijuana, THC vaping, methamphetamines)

*Southeast Region (24 Counties) = 10% increase violent felonies (February 2023) 92% increase in felony drug offenses.

STEREOTYPICAL PROFILE

10-17 years (avg. age 14-15)

Male

Single parent home

Substance use

School behavior/attendance problems

Poor Academic performance - low/failing grades


Negative associates/peers

Lack of goals, purpose, motivation

Low self-esteem

Defiant (rules/authority figures)

*Complex trauma issues



P.A.C.T. RISK ASSESSMENT

Positive Achievement Change Tool - (126 questions – updated every 5 mos. / disposition of new offense).

Helps identify: Criminogenic Needs, Risk Factors & Protective Factors = Risk Level (Low, Medium, High).

Domains: Criminal & Social Histories, Mental Health, Attitudes/Behaviors.

A.C.E. Score - Adverse Childhood Experiences:

- 1. Abuse (sexual, physical, emotional)
- Neglect (emotional, physical)
- 3. Family Violence
- 4. Substance abuse
- 5. Mental illness
- 6. Divorce/Separation
- 7. Incarceration

ACE SCORE & RESILIENCY

Research shows that the more ACE's you have the more difficult it is to develop resiliency & recover from traumatic events





2. Staff recruitment & retention.

3. TJJD Commitments = 50-60 day wait.

4. Mental Health Services – need for improved & expanded services.

5. Lack of facilities equipped to handle juveniles in need of intensive treatment services: *Mental health issues, low IQ, aggressive behavior.*

6. Social Media:

- Overwhelmingly negative influence
- Increased ability to organize / network / recruit for criminal & gang activity
- Escalation in violence, drug sales, threats, fights, firearms access & use


